NEW PATH COMMUNITY HOUSING EVALUATION

Team: Vanessa Fry, Benjamin Larsen, and Lantz McGinnis-Brown

New Path Community Housing is a 40-unit, single site, Housing First project in Ada County, Idaho, a project that Vanessa Fry has been involved with since conducting the initial feasibility study that helped launch New Path. New Path's evidence-based program is designed to address specific issues related to chronic homelessness including high utilization of emergency medical and detox services, frequent contact with the criminal justice system, and compromised overall personal well-being. As program evaluator, Idaho Policy Institute oversees all evaluation activities and works closely with New Path partners to design data collection strategies, monitoring, and reporting for this program. "Being involved with this project is something that the institute values and we are honored to have served as the evaluator for its first year," says Fry, "It's not often academics have the opportunity to see their research put into action so, personally, being part of this project since its inception and now being able to engage in its evaluation has been a highlight of my career." IPI's first annual evaluation found the impact of the New Path to include:

- A 63% decrease in utilization of emergency services,
- Total annual savings/cost avoidance of \$1,381,386, and
- An increase in overall resident well-being.

CHARTER SCHOOL PROGRAM EVALUATION

Team: Vanessa Fry, McAllister Hall, and Gabe Osterhout

It has been one year since Bluum began awarding CSP Grant funds to charter schools across the state. The third cohort of schools were selected in early April increasing the total amount of schools receiving grant funding to 13. The team completed the first-year evaluation report this month. The evaluation focused on the baseline data of the five subgrantee schools in the first cohort. The report included analysis of academic performance and stakeholder perceptions of data from the year before the schools began receiving funding as well as a financial analysis of subgrantee spending in year one. Future reports will be able to compare this baseline data with the stakeholder perceptions and academic performance of these schools after receiving funding and spending across and within all subgrantee schools.

MONTH IN REVIEW

NEW PATH PRESENTATIONS

On April 13, Vanessa Fry presented the New Path Community Housing 2019 Evaluation to Terry Reilly's board of directors. Terry Reilly is the organization that is providing supportive services for New Path and are in the facility around-the-clock to support the residents. Fry also gave the same presentation to the New Path Advisory Committee that comprises all of the partner agencies that support New Path



Community Housing. These presentations followed the completion of the evaluation and its report.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

In April, the Idaho Policy Institute conducted the first phase of a strategic planning process. The team gathered via Zoom and with the help of Holly Mikesell from the Provost's Office, began the process of forming goals and objectives for the Institute and its future. The goal of starting this process was to establish some short and long-term goals so that we can better serve our community and align those goals and objectives with Boise State University's strategic plan.

2020 UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH SHOWCASE

On April 17, Emily Pape presented at the Plenary Lightning talks for the 2020 Undergraduate Research Showcase. Her presentation titled, Why Countries Transition to Clean Energy (and why they don't), discussed the factors influencing a country's energy use and motivational factors to transition to clean energy. She looked at what factors influenced the adoption of clean energy at the national level and argued that the success of energy transition to clean energy is dependent on cost effectiveness, policy incentives, energy consumption, access to resources, concerns for the environment and the existence of energy security threats. GUINNESS WORLD RECORD HOLDER

Gabe Osterhout broke a Guinness World Record on Boise State
University's campus. He identified all national flags in 4 minutes and
51 seconds, breaking the title of "Fastest time to identify all national
flags". Osterhout considers himself an amateur vexillologist, a person
who studies flags. Not only did he need to identify 197 national flags, he
had to master the quick and error-free typing of tricky country names like Bosnia
and Herzegovina, Equatorial Guinea, and Kyrgyzstan. His world record was also made possible
by individual volunteers keeping time, taking photos, and serving as independent witnesses.

WORKSHOP ON TABLEAU

On the April 17, Lantz McGinnis-Brown presented a tutorial on Tableau. In it, he pulled Census data, cleaned the data, and then uploaded it to Tableau. In Tableau, he demonstrated how to build a visualization of total population and population by age per Idaho county and how to add those visualizations to a Tableau dashboard for sharing.

FRY FAMILY ON IDAHO MATTERS

On the April 9, the Vanessa Fry and her family were featured on an episode of Idaho Matters. In the episode, Gemma Gaudette interviews Idaho families about how they are dealing with life at home during the coronavirus. In the morning, the Fry family is broadcasting via Zoom their "ninja warrior warm-ups, which aims at getting their bodies moving and their minds ready for the day.
